"Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" I personally feel that the answer to this should be obvious, but I don't think that is what they meant. When you look at Jesus's answer, you get the impression they are talking about their community, the people who were with them following Jesus. When you look at this question in that context, it brings back memories of similar times in our own lives.

We see this all of the time in governments, our parishes, groups we may be involved in and sometimes even in our own families. Who is the greatest, who holds the most authority, who is the boss or better yet, who is in charge?

The disciples aren't any different from all of us. They wondered the exact same thing. It is how Jesus answered them that is different.

He called a child over and placed the child among them. Then very succinctly, Jesus told them that they needed to become like children just to enter the kingdom of heaven, let alone becoming the greatest. It is not any different for us. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven.

Jesus was calling on not only his disciples but all of us to become more child-like. He also doesn't mean childish. He does not want us to revert back to being kids. However, he does expect us to be child like.

When you think of a child what comes to mind? Children tend to be trusting, especially with their parents. They trust that they will not be hurt and that we will be looking out for their best interest. They put all other cares aside because they know they are protected, nurtured and generally just taken care of or looked after.



As we grow this trust tends to wane. I have heard so many people say, "I do not trust anyone until I get to know them." I'm a little strange because I have a tendency to trust everyone until they've hurt me a few times. Not once, a few times. I like to give everyone the benefit of the doubt.

However, that is not human nature. Instinctively most people are naturally distrustful. We also can be very judgey when looking at others. I have heard these phrases many times, "Look who came here today! What are they doing? Hmm... what is their intention?, What are they up to now?" Sound familiar.

That is not our job. We do not have the right to judge anyone. No one gave us this permission. That is God and only God's role. When we do not judge people and give them the benefit of the doubt just like a child you may be surprised as to what happens.

Maybe they, we will change for the better. It may even take a while. Look at who Jesus chose to help him and grow his church. Were they all stars or super beings? Maybe Judas who betrayed him? Going back to a time in your life were learning was way more important than judging and where just being good far outweighed everything else including being right.
